OVER 100 SPENT THE DAY AT MILFORD.

Enjoyable Time Spent in Outdoor Sports—Impromptu Program Fills Up the Afternoon.

Fearing that the rain, which has been threatening for the past two weeks might set in before Friday and spoil their annual May outing, the Seniors decided, on very short notice, to call the date off. Yesterday morning they betook themselves quietly to the woods at Milford and enjoyed themselves in the good old fashioned way.

When the special of three cars left the Burlington station at 7:50 yesterday morning 101 members of the Senior class were abroad dressed for fun and loaded with baseball bats, gloves, and everything else conducive to a rollicking good time. Checkers, ping pong and tiddle-de-winks were relegated to the far distant rear.

High School Day Friday.

The work in preparation for High school day, which occurs this year on next Friday, is about completed. The posters advertising the athletic meet on the campus and the interscholastic debate, to be held in the evening in the Memorial Hall, are out and the programs for the day were placed in the hands of the printer some time ago. University students wearing badges with the legend "University of Nebraska" will meet all trains and escort all parties to the University. The University guides will show the visiting students about the campus, buildings and laboratories. The exercises of welcome will be held in Memorial Hall at 11 a. m. The athletic meet and dress parade by the University Battalion will take place in the afternoon and the interscholastic debate will be held in Memorial Hall in the evening. Tickets for the debate may be obtained at the Registrar's office.

Four high schools have, thus far, indicated their intention of sending representatives to participate in the field meet. It is expected that several more will be added to this list. The schools which have indicated their intention of sending representatives are Havelock, York, Beatrice and Humboldt. Omaha and Lincoln are barred from participation in the field meet.

It is expected that about six schools will send representatives who will attempt to carry off the honors in the interscholastic debate. It is probable that Lincoln, Omaha, Beatrice, Fairbury, York, and Crete will be represented. The debate promises to be this year, as usual, a close and exciting contest.

The annual reception of the Medical Society held in Art Hall May 12 marked the close of the meetings of that society for this year. The meetings of the society have been quite well attended by the students in the Medical School and all feel greatly benefited by them.
