## YORK WINS MEET

INTERSCHOLASTIC FIELD MEET  
BY MARGIN OF 11 POINTS.

Beatrice, Fairbury and Pawnee City  
Make Good Showing, But Could  
Not Overcome Lead.

A large and enthusiastic crowd gathered on the University athletic field to witness the field meet between six of Nebraska's leading high schools. The weather was ideal and especially conducive to fast time. Probably a more representative crowd never assembled in Lincoln to witness the High School Fete Day exercises. There were large crowds from every school represented. York had a strong man in Wildman, who was responsible for fifteen of their points. Besides this school had a much larger representation on the track than any of the other schools. Beatrice was second but not close enough to York to make it interesting at any time. Fairbury and Pawnee City were third and fourth respectively in the final results. Burnham, of Pawnee City, showed up well, winning both the distance runs in very good time. This runner gave evidence of much head work in his running. The relay race was the most exciting of all the events. York pulled out a victory over Beatrice in a very close race.

The manner in which the events were pulled off yesterday gives great credit to the management. The meet, which did not commence until after 2 o'clock but was over by 5, and in time for the dress parade by the Cadets. The work of the Cadets in drill was of a very high order and many expressions of praise could be heard coming from the visitors as they viewed the different movements and the proper execution given by the Cadets. The four companies drilled so well yesterday that considerable interest has been aroused as to the outcome of competitive next Friday. All in all the fete day exercises were the best held for some time.

### ORD WINS DEBATE.

Lincoln Carries Off Second Honors.  
Omaha Comes Third.

The High School Fete Day exercises held here yesterday culminated in the annual debate of the Nebraska Interscholastic Association in Memorial Hall last evening. Six high schools, York, Beatrice, Lincoln, Omaha, Ord and Blair participated in the contest, each represented by one speaker. The judges awarded first honors to Russel Mann, of Ord; second place to Gary G. Young of Lincoln, and third place to H. W. Potter, of Omaha.

The question debated was as follows:

Resolved, That in Nebraska candidates for state, county and city elective offices and for the state and national legislatures should be nominated by direct vote.

Affirmative—York, Hubert O. Bell; Beatrice, Charles H. Stoll; Lincoln, Gary G. Young.

Negative—Omaha, H. W. Potter; Ord, Russel Mann; Blair, Carl Anderson.

The following judges rendered the decision:

Professor W. G. L. Taylor, Professor E. A. Ross, Albert Watkins, Esq.

While the judges were deliberating, Professor M. M. Fogg, C. M. Bracelean, an old University debater, now head of the History Department in the Omaha High School, and N. M. Cronin, another old Nebraska debater, who is instructor in History and Debate in the Lincoln High School, responded to calls by the audience with brief addresses.

### Last Meeting.

The last meeting for the year of the Pedagogical Club was held last evening (Thursday.) There was a large attendance. In a few brief introductory remarks Professor Luckey gave some points as to the relation of the undergraduate club to the permanent organization which meets semi-annually, and invited all members to be present at the meeting of the graduate club in June and to become members of it.

The program was a kind of symposium on the relations of the teacher to the community. Professor Candy led off with a ten minute talk on applying the principle of temperance to different sides of life where excess is liable to come in. Professor Smith, of the Department of Education, gave some pedagogical reasons why the teacher should interest himself in the Sunday school. Professor Caldwell followed with some suggestions for making school grounds and town more attractive. Professor Bolton, who was introduced as an original genius, made a few remarks along the line of broadening one's sympathies and attitudes, so as to avoid making the badge of the teacher conspicuous and thus being rated as a "teachery" teacher. Professor Jackson, of Wesleyan University, gave a suggestive talk on the teacher's relation to dancing. Professor Fossler, with characteristic enthusiasm advised the teacher to throw himself into the life of the community, and Dean Davis closed the program with the topic, "get inspiration and give inspiration."

This session closed a particularly interesting series of meetings.

### Mathewson Gets in Finals.

Mathewson furnished the surprise of the first tennis tournament yesterday by defeating Scribner two out of three of the most closely contested sets ever played on the University courts. The first set went to Mathewson 6-3, Scribner got the second after twenty-six games had been played, winning finally 14-12, and the last set came to Mathewson 6-4.

Mathewson's victory puts him against Cassidy in the finals which will be played off immediately.

## COLORADO TODAY

A STRONG TEAM COMES FROM  
BOULDER TO MEET VARSITY.

Thirteen Men Will Represent Each  
University in Contest at Fair  
Grounds.

A strong bunch of field and track athletes arrived in Lincoln last evening from Boulder, Colo., to represent the University of Colorado against Nebraska this afternoon. Thirteen men will represent each university this afternoon and from general prospects this will be the closest meet held in Lincoln for many years. All the men of both teams are in the pink of condition.

The Colorado men worked out for a short time last evening on the campus. They did not seem much the worse of the long trip and change in altitude. The captain of the Colorado team, when seen by a reporter for The Nebraskan said: "The Colorado men are in good condition, and while we are not confident of victory tomorrow, yet we are here to do our best. Nebraska can rest assured that she will have to fight for every point."

This is the attitude in which Colorado comes to Nebraska, and it is sure something will be doing on the fair grounds this afternoon.

The meet will commence at 2:30 sharp, and good street car service will be able to accommodate every one wishing to see the meet. The cars will begin running at 1:30 p. m. and continue until the meet is over. The admission of 35 and 50 cents is within the reach of all and a good crowd is expected.
