High School Day Convocation.
A very large crowd of students and
visitors attended convocation yester-
day morning to hear the High School
Day program. On account of the tardiness
of Chancellor Andrews Dean Bessey
gave a brief address of welcome
to the high school visitors, inviting
them to make themselves at home and
avail themselves of the privilege of

inspecting the grounds and buildings
of the University.
After a duet by the popular singer,
Mr. Johnson and Miss Castor, Superin-
tendent E. B. Sherman of Schuyler,
and Supt. E. L. Rouse, of Plattsmouth,
responded informally to Dr. Bessey's
address of welcome. Principle Water-
house of the Omaha High School was
then called upon for a few remarks.
Mr. Waterhouse noted the large pro-
portion of the intellectual and athletic
talent furnished the University by the
Omaha High School. Eight Phi Beta
Kappas out of seventeen given this
year were awarded to former students
of the Omaha High School.
Chancellor Andrews delivered the
closing address. After again welcom-
ing the visitors to the University the

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Chancellor remarked that while the
wealth of the great state of Nebras-
ka was often measured in terms of
cattle, crops and industry, the highest
wealth of the state lay in reality in the
young people in the schools and col-
leges. Chancellor Andrews said that
the University administration had
been criticized by the public press for
not "overhauling" the University, for
not "sitting on the lid" and putting a
stop to Sneak Day, class scraps and
other cherished institutions of the Uni-
versity. The Chancellor added that
while he had no idea of following the
advice of the press, he certainly would
not "sit on the lid" on High School
Day.
The program closed with a selection
by the University Cadet Band.
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
