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REGISTRATION LARGE.

The First Day's Registration Largest in History of Institution.

The registration for the first two days shows a large increase over that of previous years. The statement was given out that the registration of the first day was the largest in the history of the institution. If the present conditions continue the total number of students registered in Nebraska this year will far exceed that of any former year.

All trains entering the city, whether from south or north, east or west, bring many students. There are more students coming from other states this year than before and this is in itself a source of gratification to the University officials. The University guides are kept busy directing the many Freshmen to the University and Registrar's office. The office force is larger than before in order that the influx of students may be properly cared for and that as quickly as possible.

The number of University students proper will be greatly increased by the beginning of the term at the State Farm. From present indications there will be a good increase in the number of students taking agricultural studies this year. This is to be expected, though because of the great benefit the Farm is being to the farmers throughout the state.

the candidates. Today the bleachers will be put up and fixed in readiness for the rooters, and tomorrow the fence will be placed around the entire field. The semaphore is to be erected in its usual place, the south end of the field.

The field is not in the best of condition as yet. There are many ruts and it is very uneven. The sowing of the field last spring did not bring the desired results, for after cutting the grass it was found that a stiff stubble and hard ground remained.

The line up of the men Saturday is a conundrum to all save Coach Booth. But it is felt sure that all the candidates will be given a chance. Tonight the teams will line up for the first time, and be given practice in end running.

The admission for Saturday's game has been made 25 cents to any part of the grounds.

STAG RECEPTION.

The sale of season football tickets begins tomorrow morning, the only place of sale on the campus being the Nebraskan office, on the second floor of the main building. Tickets for the eight home games, if bought separately, would cost over five dollars, but bought together, cost only three dollars, so that every student should buy himself a season book and save money. The sale will only continue one week, and there will be no solicitors selling the tickets as heretofore.
