## LARGE SQUAD OUT

MANY NEW CANDIDATES REPORT FOR PRACTICE LAST EVENING.

Some Fast Work Done by the Team on the Newly Harrowed and Soft Field.

The football squad was greatly enlarged last evening by the appearance of several new candidates. The new men went into the game with an earnestness that will prove fatal to some of the old men unless they continue work and training with equal enthusiasm. Some fifty-three men were on the field and Assistant Coach Westover and Captain Borg put them through the stiffest work of the season thus far.

The absence of Booth does not seem to cause any fall in Nebraska's stock in the market, for everything is moving along as steadily as if the big coach was on the field. Instructions come from him every day and these instructions are followed out as implicitly by the men as if he were himself giving them direct. The men will show much improvement in the coming game with the High School over that of last Saturday.

The squad was divided into three sections yesterday, and given some practice in catching and running down punts. Cotton, Beekly and Morse did the punting. Nelson, who played guard on last Saturday, is being tried at center some this week, and shows himself to be very accurate in passing. Cotton was given a trial at kicking goals from placement and succeeded in putting three out of four between the goal posts. Denslow received the ball, but was a little slow in placing it, but with more practice this should be quite effective in a close game. Eager was tried out at quarter.

Some concern is shown among the football enthusiasts at the critical condition of Benedict's knee. According to previous reports, Benny reported for practice but in punting he threw his leg out at the knee. The old wound of the Iowa game may again prove sufficiently bad to keep Benedict out of the game this season, although he may be able to get into at least the big games.

The field was in better condition last night than it has been at any time yet. The ground had been thoroughly disced yesterday with a harrow and this made it much more soft, while it did not hinder fast playing. The tackling was much better, as the men were more anxious to leave their feet and tackle with more exactness than any time heretofore.

The first men's mass meeting of the year will occur tomorrow morning at 11 o'clock in the chapel. A number of prominent professors and alumni will address the meeting and raise the enthusiasm to a high pitch. Professor Frank W. Smith, formerly of the department of Education, is now filling the position of principal of the Normal Training School for Teachers at Paterson, N. J. Professor Smith resigned a good-salaried school position in 1901 to take a fellowship in Education in this University, because it opened an attractive field of pedagogical work. The fellowship involved teaching from the outset. He was soon appointed instructor and then adjunct professor, passing by one or two opportunities to more than double salary because they did not offer the work most desired at the time. Last July Professor Smith had opportunities to consider what was said to be the most important professorship in a progressive western college, involving philosophy and pedagogy, and the principalship at Paterson.
