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**COUNT LUETZOW SPEAKS AT KOMENSKY BANQUET**

MANY PROMINENT PERSONAGES PRESENT AT EVENT HELD IN NOBLEMAN'S HONOR.

The Komensky club entertained Count Francis Luetzow and his wife at a banquet at the Lincoln hotel last night. Over two hundred guests were present, including many of the prominent Bohemians of the state. Chancellor Avery presided with Professor Sarka Hrbkova, of the Bohemian department, acting as toastmistress. On the toast list were Governor Chester H. Aldrich, Senator E. E. Pláček, Col. Charles Smrha, Dean W. G. Hastings, of the law college; Frank A. Stech, and Frank H. Mizera, president of the Komensky club of the University. The address delivered by Count Luetzow was last on the program, which was a long and interesting one.

**Count Speaks of Komensky.**

Owing to the late hour at which the banquet began, Count Luetzow spoke for but a short while. He told of Komensky's life and world-wide prominence as an educator. This great man was a Bohemian by birth, but did not confine himself to his native land, gaining both in America and Europe a reputation as a great scholar. The count explained how these societies named for Komensky have been formed all over the world in his honor.

**Chancellor Likes Bohemian Life.**

Chancellor Avery declared that if he could not be an American he would choose Bohemia as his home because of her many great men. Governor Aldrich also expressed his enjoyment of the companionship of the Bohemians represented at the banquet.

**Music Accompanies Banquet.**

The music enjoyed during the entire evening was of a Bohemian character and was especially fine. Beautiful decorations were profuse, the color design being red and white, in honor of the count's nationality.

Lincoln is the point farthest west which the count visits. From here he returns to Omaha and farther east.
