GETS JOBS FOR STUDENTS

THE UNIVERSITY EMPLOYMENT BUREAU ASSISTS YOUTHS IN EARNING \$11,000.

During the year over 490 jobs have been secured for students by the University Y. M. C. A. employment bureau, three-fifths of which were odd jobs of from a few hours to several weeks in duration. However, this year, as last, the percentage of studenus earning part or all of their expenses through school is large, and a great many of these sustaining jobs were secured through the bureau. Over \$11,000 has been earned by the students who have secured work in this manner.

The employment secretary of the university Y. M. C. A., who has charge of the bureau, is G. A. Atchison, and he says that efforts are now being made to place as many students in summer jobs as possible. Mr. Atchison is in communication with many prominent alumni and firms which employ students during the three months of summer, and students who have not made their arrangements for the summer and who desire work should see him at once and file applications. Mr. Atchison's office is in the main hall of the Temple "just behind Demosthenes," and he is there from 10 until 12:30 every morning, when he will be glad to advise or assist anyone in the matter of securing
