

## BASEBALL OUTLOOK STILL WEARS TINGE OF GLOOM

ATHLETIC MANAGEMENT HEARS NOTHING NEW FROM MISSOURI VALLEY OFFICIALS.

Nothing has yet been heard by the athletic management of the University regarding the summer baseball situation, taken under advisement by a committee of the Missouri Valley conference. With the opening of the summer pastime season only a few weeks away in spite of the winter weather of March, Nebraska officials do not know whether a team will be organized for this season or not.

The matter of changing the present rules of the conference concerning eligibility has been under advisement all winter by the committee, and it was understood by the local management that the members had reached a conclusion some time ago, but if they have nothing has been received to that effect at Nebraska.

When the dispute over the rules first arose, Dr. Clapp announced on behalf of the local institution that unless the rules were changed to allow the playing of summer baseball Nebraska would not have a team, and so the matter stands. Under the present rules an athlete at the University is not eligible to enter any sport if during the summer he played with any other team than that of his home town. Furthermore, if he played in a game to which admission was charged, whether it was with his home team or not, he is considered a profes-

sional and ruled out of collegiate sports.

These two rulings practically placed the ban on baseball as a summer sport of students. Rules to the same effect, though perhaps not so stringent, were in use in many of the inter-collegiate conferences of the country and during the past winter there has been an attempt to repeal these rules. Led by Nebraska, the matter was brought to the consideration of the Missouri Valley conference with the result that the committee was appointed.

From the delay that it has taken the committee to report, the officials believe that the committee has refused to recommend the repeal of the rule and no preparations are being made to get out the baseball players. —Lincoln Evening News.
