## BISEBALL OUTLIOOX STILL WEARS TINGE OF GLOOM

ATHLETIC MANAGEMENT HEARS NOTHING NEW FROM MIS. sOURI VALLEY OFFICIALS.

Nothing has yet been heard by the athletic management of the Unlverslt regarding the summer baseball situa tion, taken under advisement by a committee of the Missourl Valley con ference. With the opening of the summer pastime season only a few weeks away in spite of the winter weather of March. Nebraska officials do not know whether a team wif be organized for this season or not.
The matter of changing the present rules of the conference concerning eligibility has been under advisement all winter by the committee, and it was understood by the local manage ment that the members had reached a conclusion some time ago, but if hey have nothing has been recelved to that effect at Nebraska
When the dispute over the rules first arose, Dr Clapp announced on behalf of the local institution that unless the rules were changed to al low the playing of summer baseball Nebraska would not have a team, and so the matter stands. Under the present rules an athlete at the University is not eligible to enter any sport if during the summer he played with any other team than that of bis home town. Furthermore, if he played in a game to which admission was charged, whether it was with his home team or not, he is considered a profes.
slonal and ruled out of colleglate sports
These two rullings practically placed the ban on baseball as a summer sport of students. Rules to the same ef fect, though perhaps not so stringent, were in use in many of the inter-col legiate conferences of the country and during the past winter there has been an attempt to repeal these rules. Led by Nebraska. the matter was brought to the consideration of the Missour Valley conference with the result that the committee was appointed.
From the delay that it has taken the committee to report, the officials belleve that the committee has refused to recommend the repeal of the rule and no preparations are being made to get out the baseball players
