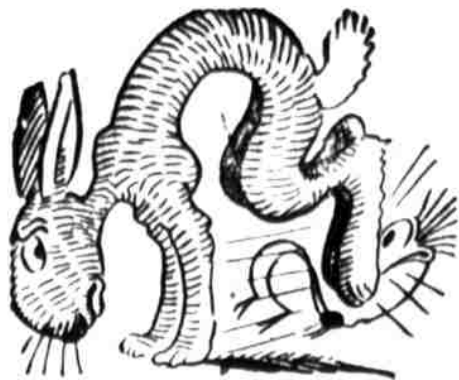
**Phi Alpha Tau Meets.**

**CALDWELL HEARS WAR TALK.**

Nebraska University Professor Writes of Impending Conflict in Europe.

Professor Persinger recently received another letter from Professor Caldwell, who has been traveling in Europe the past winter. At the time he wrote he was in Dresden, Germany, but expected to leave soon for Rome. There he expects to remain for several months. From Rome he will make trips to the other points of interest near the Holy City.

While he was in London, and even after he crossed the channel, he wrote, the main subject of conversation was the probability of a future war between England and Germany. He said that abroad this event is predicted by everybody and, moreover, all expect it within a short time.

Countries not interested sum it up by saying that while Germany's fleet is a military luxury, England's supremacy depends upon her's.
