GYM EXHIBIT BIG AFFAIR.

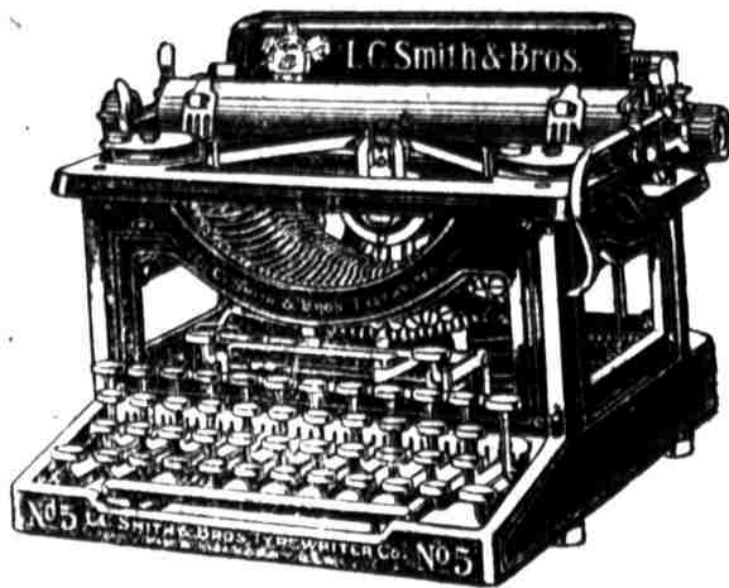
Will Be Largest of Kind Ever Attempted at Nebraska.

Eight years ago the exhibition was put on with a view to display the work of the department only, but it proved such a success that since it has been used as a very fruitful source of revenue to provide for the team's expenses to the eastern collegiate contest. The Collegiate Association is composed of all western universities, among them being Minnesota, Wisconsin, Chicago, Illinois, Nebraska, Indiana and Washington. The contest this year is to be held in Champaign, Ill. In the local exhibition there will be altogether about 600 participants. The drill work has been going on all winter.
