

ALUMNI CALLED TO HELP GET BIGGER UNIVERSITY

LANCASTER COUNTY GRADUATES ORANIZE ASSOCIATION—FLING OUTLINES NEEDS.

Alumni of the University of Nebraska met in the University cafeteria, Monday evening, for a banquet and to form an alumni association. About sixty former students of the school were present. The organization is to be known as the Lancaster County Alumni Association.

The principal address of the evening was made by Prof. F. M. Fling, who talked on the needs of the University. Professor Fling stated that there were only two buildings on the campus, the physical and engineering laboratories, which were modern and had not been outgrown by the departments they occupied. The hall occupied by the botanical department has been condemned for two years as unsafe, the old University hall in the center of the campus is not good for more than a few years, the library has been doublestacked and is now nearly filled to repletion.

The speaker declared that if the alumni of the University took the matter in hand they could secure a change in University conditions.

Higher salaries, more ground for the campus, a group of buildings costing in the neighborhood of a million and a half dollars to be built in the next ten years, and a raise in professional salaries and appropriations for departments so as to put the teaching force on a plane with other state institutions in the west, were the changes which Professor Fling declared to be imperative.

Chancellor Avery acted as toastmaster. Among the others to speak were N. Z. Snell, Mrs. Paul Clark, O. W. Mier, S. P. Dobbs, Tom L. Hall, F. E. Edgerton, Miss Alice Ensign, A. A. Reed, Frank E. Bishop and G. W. Kline. L. C. Oberlies was elected president of the association, with Lawrence Fossler vice president and G. W. Kline, secretary and treasurer.
