PREPARING GERMAN PLAY.

Schauspieler Cast Spending Much Painstaking Labor on Drama.

The charm of "Minna von Barnhelm," to be presented by the Schauspieler, April 19, which in a large measure accounts for its permanent value as a classic in the field of comedy, lies partly in the substance and partly in the form of the work. The qualities, however, that endear it to successive generations of theatre-goers are perhaps rather to be found in its faithful delineation of human character, its higher concentrated and natural plot, its real life, and its simple and forcible style.

Much painstaking labor has already been spent in the preparation of this drama. A number of one-act plays were given in which the peculiar fitness of each member of the cast was thoroughly tested. This circumstance, and the fact that the characters in "Minna von Barnhelm" are sharply
