BLAINE BALLAH SUFFERS PAIN FUL HURTS IN COLLISION.

RUNS INTO FOOTBALL GOAL POST

Outfield Candidate Sustains Badly Cut Head and Ear, But Will Con-

tinue Practice.

While running back on a fly ball during baseball practice yesterday afternoon Blaine Ballah, one of the candidates for an outfield berth, collided with a goal post and sustained painful injuries. The left side of his head was badly cut and his left ear was seriously torn.

Ballah's injuries were at first thought dangerous, and he was taken to the Lincoln sanitarium, but was later removed to the Delta Tau house. It was stated last night that he would probably recover from his injuries in ten days or so. He will not withdraw from the squad, but will resume practice as soon as he recovers sufficiently. Ballah is one of the veteran players on the squad and is generally conceded an excellent chance of landing one of the garden jobs.

Professor George Howard yesterday in a sociology class criticized the governor's attitude toward Graham Taylor, the noted sociologist, who had found fault with the Nebraska penitentiary.

He commented on the rudeness of the governor's remark about Mr. Tay-Governor Aldrich was said to have declared, "I notice that those who give advice are seldom put in positions of responsibility."

Professor Howard also said that the governor was trying to cover up conditions at the penitentiary. "I happen to know," he said, "that only a few of the bad conditions have been discovered. There are others which are far worse."

Great applause greeted Dr. Howard's speech.
