GROWTH OF DRAMATICS.

A wave of dramatic enthusiasm seems to have swept our University. Whereas only a few years ago one or two plays constituted the entire dramatic schedule for the school year, now the students have the opportunity of attending from six to a dozen.

The Dramatic club, the father of such organizations, was in former times accustomed to give but one big performance a year. This, with the annual senior class play, held just before graduation, composed the extent of the program.

Now the Dramatic club gives one play each semester, the senior class holds its annual performance as usual and the junior class has entered the ranks by staging a drama equal in importance to either of the aforemen tioned.

The institution of University night last year gave another opening for amateur actors, mostly of the Eddie Foy type, and suggested the idea of burlesque and music. Minstrel shows and takeoffs on various phases of unlversity life found a warm reception in the hearts of the student body, and encouraged certain male students to form the Kosmet Klub, an organization whose main aim is to present a musical comedy. This club, like many similar ones in the larger universities, proposed to stage a production whose lines and music should be written by a student or alumnus of the University. This they have done, and are now working on an opera, which is to be staged in the Oliver May 3.

The Dramatic club, which held its second annual tryouts last Tuesday evening, is one of the most exclusive and prosperous organizations in the school. The competition for places on the club is keen, and is each year more hotly contested. It has turned out several amateur actors of no mean ability, some of whom have coached high school plays over the state.

Perhaps the same spirit has revived the interest in the Glee and Mandolin clubs which is making those bodies once more powerful.

Some idea of the importance at tached to University dramatics may be gained from the fact that at least five all university dates are to be reserved for such events in next year's schedule. If this tendency does not go too far it can accomplish much good, for an appreciation of the power of the drama is essential to an eduThe Watering Place.
