COPYING NEBRASKA'S PLAN.

Wisconsin Installs Practice Courses in Pleading in Law College.

The fact that a great number of the institutions of the law college are being copied by other universities should be convincing evidence that this college is one of the best in the United States. The following is an account of the installing of a practice originated or adopted a great many years ago by the college:

"In order to teach students in the law school how to plead cases, practice courses in pleading have been started at the University of Wisconsin. A practice court has been established, which is conducted essentially the same as a real law court and each student in the law school is required to conduct two or more cases in this court. Not only must he prepare the pleadings and the drawing up of the case, but he must also carry through the various steps in the case from the beginning to the final judgment."
