CAPTAIN YATES GIVES REGIMENT ILLUSTRATED LECTURE ON RUSSO-JAPANESE CONFLICT.

The cadet regiment, instead of "drilling on Twelfth street," listened en masse to an illustrated lecture by Captain Yates on the Japanese Russian war last night. The lecture was to have been given during the winter, but owing to orders by the War Department, which sent the pictures. was delayed.

The lecture was on the movements of the Japanese army against. Port Arthur, and the pictures showed the defensive and offensive methods of the "little brown soldiers," The landing of the 750,000 troops and their supplies was in itself one of the greatest undertakings of any war. After the landing in August, 1904, the Japs were on the offensive nearly all the time until the surrender of the fort, in September, 1905

The pictures brought out the vastness of such an undertaking, showing the miles of trenches and siege works that were thrown up by the Japs. Pictures of dismounted Russian siege guns and destroyed redoubts showed the effect of the Japanese gun fire On the other hand, the slow and expensive system of transportation used by the Japs and the danger to the lit tle fighters from their own artillery

Captain Yates was stationed in West Point during and after the war, on the war given by the United States military attaches and war correspondents with the Japanese army. Major Marsh U. S. Artillery, took the pletures, displaying much bravery in obtaining them, and gaining the respect of the Japs by his indifference to dan

This is the second game that the team has had and although the men are all showing up well in fielding, they yet show a few weak spots in hitting and base running. However, it will not take long to remedy these defects and by the end of the week when the team meets the Doane warriors in battle at Crete, it will be working in good shape in all departments.

The line up of the team in the games so far has been a shifting one, the coach endeavoring to give every man a chance to work out in the various positions and it is yet uncertain who will be taken on the first trip to Doane. So far the following men have been used:

Catchers, Green, Towle, Pearson and Buol; pitchers, Rodman, Schmidt, Wake, Purdy and Andrews, first base, Underwood and Pearson; second base, Flory, Hartwell and Cline; shortstop. Carr. Hartwell and Haskell; third base, Haskell and Lofgren; outfielders, Oliver, Hyde, Frank and Towle. Green is a new man that has been tried out behind the bat and is a good fielding catcher, but has proved somewhat weak in throwing to second, but it is early in the game to judge a man in this art and as the season progresses his weakness may disappear. Another new man has reported to the coach as a first baseman. He is Ben Groves and it is said that he is a firstclass initial sacker.

Now that the team has taken on some form the candidates for the leadership have made their appearance. The only one to announce himself so far is Carr, and it is thought that he will have a good chance to land the captaincy.
