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## BASEBALL SEASON IS BEGUN WITH VICTORY

RODMAN HOLDS DOANE TO TWO  
HITS, SCORING SHUTOUT.

## ARE TO PLAY TARKIO TOMORROW

Pearson and Underwood Are Expected  
to Be Able to Participate  
in Contest.

Nebraska started off the baseball season Saturday at Crete by shutting out Doane 4 to 0. The reconstructed team that represented Nebraska on the diamond played up to topnotch form and at no time was the outcome in doubt. Haskell was the star of the contest, figuring in three brilliant double plays, getting three hits in four times at bat, stealing five bases and scoring two of the four runs. Rodman pitched the whole game and was steady throughout, pitching great ball for an early season game. The score by innings:

## Yannigans Defeated.

Yesterday the 'varsity put in a good day's practice by walloping the Yannigans in a hard batting contest, with Schmidt in the box for the 'varsity. Towle and Haskell pulled off several spectacular fielding plays, while Hyde, Groves, Van Cleve, Oliver and Buol did good work with the stick. Two new faces appeared in the 'varsity lineup for trials, Hall behind the bat and Hart at shortstop. Both men put up a good fielding game, but are rather weak at the bat.

Tomorrow at 3:30 o'clock Nebraska will meet Tarkio College on Nebraska field. By that time both Pearson and Underwood will likely be eligible, as both men have been making up their back work within the last few days. Coach Stiehm is expecting a close, hard game and in all probability will use Rodman or Schmidt in the box. A twenty-five cent piece or a season ticket will admit to the game.

## Three Mentioned for Captain.

Now that Carr is out of the running, the captaincy question is again bobbing up. Haskell has been prominently mentioned for the position, but has so far refused to allow his name to appear, feeling that since this is his first year in athletics, some older man should have it. Three other men being mentioned by their friends for the position are Towle, Rodman and Hyde. All of these have been playing great ball and are third year men in school, all being registered in the law college.

## Ineligibility of Three Athletes May Hurt Team's Chances.

The Drake tryouts will probably be held Thursday afternoon. At the present time, McGowan, Racely and Hiltner are ineligible and must have brushes with the professors before they can be reinstated. ## CLAPP HEADS ASSOCIATION

NEBRASKA MAN CHOSEN PRESIDENT  
OF INTER-COLLEGIATE  
GYMNASTIC ORGANIZATION.

At the annual meet of the Western Inter-collegiate Gymnastic Association, held last Saturday at Illinois, Dr. Clapp was elected president for the coming year.

The meet was won by Illinois with a total of 1,074½ points, Wisconsin came second with 957½, Minnesota third with 920½, and Chicago fourth with 782½.

Nebraska was represented only in the wrestling matches, where she won second place, with ten points. Ruby won the middleweight contest, Phares won second in the special 125-pound class, Guenther third in the lightweight, and McCormick third in the heavyweight class. The Minnesota team won the wrestling event with 16 points and Indiana came third with 5 points.

The next meet is to be held at Wisconsin.

## Y.W.C.A. CONFERENCE ENDS

DELEGATES ENJOY THREE DAYS  
OF ENTHUSIASTIC AND  
VARIED MEETINGS.

The Y. W. C. A. convention held in Lincoln the latter part of last week closed Sunday night after three days of enthusiastic meetings. The banquet Saturday evening was a great success, with an attendance of over four hundred. Miss Louise Curtis acted as toastmistress. Many inspiring talks were listened to.

Sunday morning the delegates attended the First Presbyterian church in a body, where they heard Dr. W. W. Lawrence speak on "What the Church Should Mean to the College Woman." Sunday afternoon Miss Oolah Burner led in a vesper service; Mrs. Byers spoke on "The Place of the Young Woman's Christian Association in the Community." The farewell service Sunday night was conducted by Miss Eva F. Morris.

The attendance from other schools to the convention was even greater than anticipated, over two hundred girls coming from schools as far away as five hundred miles. Before leaving Sunday night many of the delegates expressed their appreciation of the entertainment they had enjoyed while in Lincoln. The delegates present at the conference were as follows: Number of delegates, 185; outside secretaries and speakers, 15; total, 200; territorial committee members, 3; faculty and advisory board, 13; schools represented, 26; denominational colleges, 15; normals, 3; high schools, 3; state universities, 2; city universities, 1; agricultural colleges, 1; county associations, 1. The largest delegation was from Cotner, 36; second largest from Wesleyan, 25; third largest from Doane, 21. The largest percentage of membership was from the University of Omaha.

## RACE FOR CORNHUSKER POSITIONS GROWS KEEN

ONE CANDIDATE WITHDRAWS AND  
TWO MORE COME OUT.

## A PAIR SEEKING EACH PLACE NOW

Smrha and Kavan Latest to An-  
nounce—Election Will Be Held  
This Morning in Armory.

The latest developments in the sophomore race for the positions of business manager and managing editor of the 1913 Cornhusker have resulted in three very material changes.

Robinson, who contemplated running for the position of managing editor, has decided to withdraw as a result of an intended change in his course of study which would prevent him doing justice to the duties of the position.

## Baseball Man Out.

The entry of a new candidate into the field leaves two aspirants for the position. Albert M. Smrha, who but recently announced his candidacy, comes from Milligan, Nebr., and is a non-fraternity man, a pitcher on this year's baseball squad, and is in the academic college.

Chandler Trimble, of Omaha, the other candidate for managing editor, was a member of the freshman 'varsity basketball team, attends the college of law, belongs to the Alpha Tau Omega fraternity, and has been prominent in class affairs.

In the race for business manager, there are also two candidates, a new one having come out in the last few days in the person of William Kavan. Kavan is from Omaha, a non-fraternity man and member of the inter-class basketball team and of the 'varsity squad.

## Driscoll an Idaho Man.

Lynn Driscoll, whose candidacy for business manager has been announced for some time, is from Boise, Idaho, a member of the Phi Kappa Psi fraternity, and was chairman of the sophomore hop committee this year.

The election of the candidates for the Cornhusker positions will take place at the class meeting to be held this morning in the chapel at 11:30 o'clock. With two men for each office, the rivalry has become intense, and those working for each candidate are hot upon the trail of every voter.
