

CAPTAIN YATES IS SENT TO ANOTHER POSITION

UNIVERSITY COMMANDANT RELIEVED FROM DUTY HERE.

THE ORDER GOES INTO EFFECT JULY 1

Petition Will Likely Be Circulated by Students Asking for His Retention Here.

Capt Halsey E. Yates, commandant of the University cadets received orders yesterday morning relieving him from further duty at the University and assigning him to the Thirtieth Infantry, the order to become effective July 1. The Thirtieth Infantry is at present stationed at San Presidio, Calif., having recently returned from the Philippines.

It was rumored about the University yesterday that a petition would be circulated at once asking the war department to retain Captain Yates at his present post.

Not a Surprise.

The orders came as no great surprise, Chancellor Avery having been notified some time ago, in fact, that they were coming. Moreover, it is the custom of the war department to shift frequently commissioned officers, even when stationed on special duty.

When Chancellor Avery received his first intimation that a transfer was likely, he wrote to Washington asking that an extension of time be granted in the case of Captain Yates in view of the excellent work that the latter had done with the student soldiers. His letter, however, judging from the orders received Monday, seemed to bear little weight at Washington. The Chancellor is desirous of retaining Captain Yates at the University and signified his intention Monday morning of again petitioning the department. He has very slight hopes, however, of being successful.

Four years ago when Capt. John G. Workizer, then commandant, was assigned to another post by the war department, a petition by the students and letters from the Chancellor operated to secure an extension of his detail for one more year. However, at that time Captain Workizer had been at the University only two years. Captain Yates, by the first of next September, would have been here three years, having already exceeded the regularly allotted time by almost one year.

Successor Unknown.

Nothing is said in the orders as to the officer to relieve the present commandant. In this matter the war department takes into consideration the recommendations and suggestions of the University authorities, Captain Yates having been assigned to his present post partly through local solicitation.

Captain Yates has been commandant at the University since 1909. Since that time the department has grown from one battalion of four companies to three battalions of three companies each. The present commandant is himself a Nebraska man and a graduate of the State University.

Captain Yates said Monday that he had been expecting to receive the orders for some time, as he had been on detached duty for nearly four years, which is the limit allowed by the department. The Seventeenth, which is Captain Yates' original regiment, is at Fort McPherson, near Atlanta, Ga.

NO DRAMATIC CLUB PLAY.

Free Recital Will Be Given Instead Some Time This Semester.

This action was taken by the cast committee of the club at a recent meeting when it was decided that the play could not be gotten in shape in time for the date set for its presentation, April 20.

Heretofore the Dramatic Club has made an effort to put on two plays a year in addition to the annual Ivy Day performance, but with the growth of dramatics at the University and the consequent increasing number of public performances it has been thought advisable to do away with the second semester play and devote the majority of the club's energies to one big play a year.

The plan is to give a free recital some time during the second semester which would consist of two or more one-act sketches, in which more of the talent of the organization could be brought out and a greater amount of versatility developed. This plan was tried several years ago and proved to be a great success and as a result Miss Howell, president of the club, favors giving it a further trial.

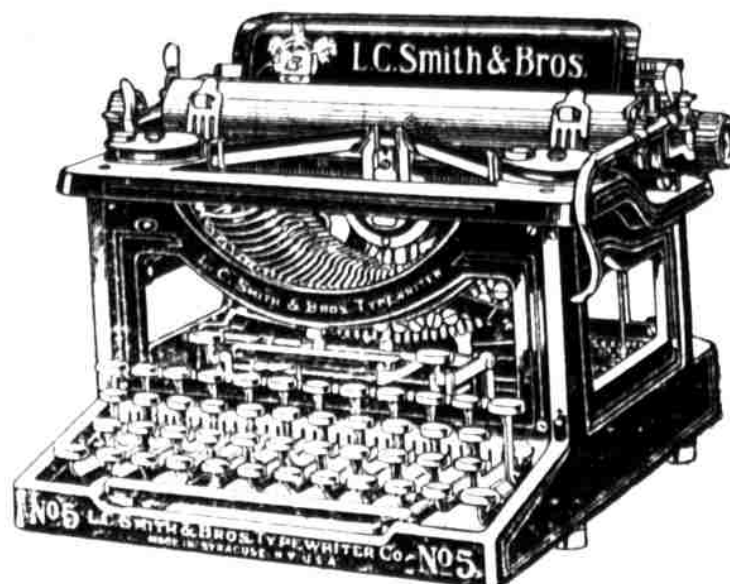
