

ALUMNI PLAN ADOPTED TO GOVERN FRATERNITIES

COMMITTEE OF THREE PRACTICALLY GIVEN POWER OF REGULATING GREEKS.

The plan of reorganization of the inter-fraternity council as submitted to the Board of Regents recently by the fraternity alumni has been adopted in its original form by a committee consisting of Chancellor Avery and Regent Allen, who were empowered by the committee to act in the matter. The new plan differs from the old in that it requires two alumni members in place of one to meet in the inter-fraternity council with the one active representative. By placing the power of appointing the alumni members in the hands of a committee consisting of the Chancellor, the president of the Board of Regents and the president of the council, it practically gives this committee the absolute power of regulating the Greek organizations of the University.

All legislation and other acts by the inter-fraternity council will be strictly enforced by the University authorities.

M'GOWAN SETS NEW RECORD.

Nebraska Track Man Star Performer at Drake Meet.

"Beany" McGowan, by virtue of setting a new Missouri valley record of 2:02 in the half mile, was the star performer of the Nebraska track team in the relay meet at Drake last Saturday. Nebraska finished second in the two-mile relay, being beaten out by Minnesota. The field of runners was said to be the most brilliant assembled west of the Mississippi in recent years, seven new records being produced.

George Racely, who ran in the quarter mile relay, was painfully injured when he tripped and fell while trying to cut across in front of his nearest competitor. Racely was leading at the time and his accident probably deprived Nebraska of a victory in this event.
