

BOOST FOR MEDICAL SCHOOL

MEDICAL ASSOCIATION PUTS APPROVAL ON NEW BUILDING AT OMAHA.

At the meeting of the Medical society, which includes about 1,000 physicians and surgeons throughout the state, and which has just finished holding its annual convention, a formal resolution was passed favoring the action of the legislature and the governor in granting appropriations last year for the new medical buildings which are to be located at Omaha.

The society is now almost unanimously in favor of developing a strong medical school in the University, and the former strong opposition which existed has now died out. Many professors from the medical college of the University took a prominent part, both in the scientific discussions and in transacting the business of the meeting.
