W. A. Carriker, Jr., Meets Success in Government Work in South America.

Dean Wolcott of the medical col lege is in receipt of a letter from W A Carriker, Jr., a former Nebraska student who has made good in South America. Mr. Carriker was a student here from 1899 to 1903 specializ ing in zoology and entomology, leav ing college to go with Professor Bruner to Costa Rica.

He did not return, but remained two or three years in Costa Rica as a collector for the United States National Museum, the American Museum of National History of New York City. and the Carnegie Museum of Pitts burg. Coming back to the states he was assistant curator of birds at the latter institution, returning a few years later to South America as a collector, traveling through Venezuela and Columbia

While in the former country Mr. Carriker visited regions hitherto not visited by white men and made a special study of bird lore.

He is now representing a Cincinna-Ti coffee concern in Columbia and intends to make a visit to Lincoln soon in search of some young college students to go into business with him.

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
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
