#### THE CHANCELLORS STATEMENT

The Chancellor, after an extended consultation with Captain Yates, is sued the following statement with regard to his action upon the petition presented to him by the cadet officers:

"My attitude in regard to the con duct of certain cadets at Crete, and the discipline meted out by the commandant captain Yates, is as follows:

"First, Captain Yates is in entire charge of the cadets in all strictly military matters. I can do no more than to use my good offices in asking him or some future commandant to give a rehearing to the offending ca dets, to take into consideration new evidence, or for other causes. Fur ther, I cannot recommend to the gov ernor the granting of a state commis sion to a cadet officer without the commandant's approval, any more than I can recommend a senior for a state teacher's certificate without the approval of the head of the department in which the prospective teach er's major work has been taken. 1 have already gone as far as I feel justified in the present instance, by indicating to a few of the officers of the battalion that they have my permis sion to request in a respectful way that the commandant grant a new

"On the other hand, the matter of retaining in the University cadets charged with misconduct rests entire ly in my hands. Any request from the commandant for suspension or ex pulsion has precisely the same effect as a request from any other official of the institution. It is, therefore, en tirely possible for a student to gradu ate from the University with a clean record so far as the scholastic side of his work is concerned without his being continued in the battalion, or recommended to the governor of the state by the commandant for a commission in the national guard on graduation from the University."

MORRISON | moval in a dignified way, and our only desire is, not that we be reinstated but that we be vindicated in the eyes of all the students of the University and the people of the state. The whole thing is a result of making a mountain out of a mole hill"

Wood's statement

"There can be no object in review ing the whole chain of events which culminated in the near-riot, for by this time all who are interested in learning of the matter have had ample opportunity to acquaint themselves with the facts. The position of the officers of K company is this in a nut shell We admit ourselves guilty of technical offense in not attempting to restrain the men of our company from using abusive language toward the commandant, but we firmly believe that all the men, both officers and privates. are equally guilty of the same offense, and that there is justification for the attitude taken by the entire regiment at that time. Our conviction was based upon the free and frank confession of all the men in K company Upon the same questions asked of us by the court martial any other company in the two battalions could have been convicted

"We do not hope for reinstatement but we do ask vindication in the eyes of the student body and all others who are at all interested in the affair, and are confident that a fair and impartial trial would not only result in freeing us from the charge placed against us. but would reveal facts which would show that the blame for the entire occurrence does not rest upon any one of the cadet officers.

"Nothing gives us more satisfaction than the knowledge that our brother officers have sufficient confidence in our integrity and efficiency as cadet officers to testify to their outraged feelings by unanimously petitioning for a reconsideration of the whole matter, and that our own company by its own unswerving loyalty for nishes the best possible refutation of

Al Kennedy, second heutenant, gavehis views as follows:

"The men were all angry when we started because they had had to work hard all week. They were pulled out of a sound sleep and most of them were not awake enough to know what was going on. We ran into a barb wire fence and got the companies all mixed up, so that it was impossible to maintain company formation. When Captain Yates stopped as I was in the extreme rear and must have been at least 100 yards behind the front of the company M. I and K companies were all mixed up; it was too dark to tell who was doing the velling or who threw the clods which bit the commandant. It was my observation that no officers in the regiment kept order that night. My only regret is that I cannot help company K in the compet."
