

STIEHM PREPARING FOR MISSOURI VALLEY MEET

Nebraska faces the Missouri Valley track meet, to be held Friday and Saturday at Des Moines, with her strongest men in readiness for the contest, but with small hopes of defeating Missouri, her closest competitor in the fight for first place. Kansas University and Coe College are competitors to be feared also, and the prospects for an exciting meet are good.

Racely is getting into better trim and his entry will add materially to Nebraska's chances of victory. Becker, the crack long distance runner, and "Beany" McGowan are showing up well in the daily workouts. Reavis and Wherry, the track men who attended the recent cadet encampment, are both badly stiffened and they may be left out of the final entries Friday if these bad effects do not disappear in the meanwhile.

Missouri will be represented in the weights by the Anderson brothers, who have starred for the last two years in Valley track meets. Nebraska has no one who can touch either of these men unless they far exceed all records made so far this year. The "houn" song men are also rumored to have a new crackerjack shot putter this year, which is more bad news to Nebraska. Nicholson, who runs the high hurdles for Missouri, holds the honor of winning in the Pennsylvania relay games last year. He is considered a very probable member of the American Olympic team this year.

Huxey, the low hurdle man, stands as one of the fastest men in the Valley in this event.

Coe College is to be well represented in the sprints. Wilson is well known throughout the west as a fast 100 yard and 220 yard man and will probably uphold his reputation in the meet Friday. In the hurdles Coe will have Stunkard, another man scheduled to make the Olympic team this year.

The mile race promises to be interesting. Farquar of Kansas will be on the job again and a merry meeting is in prospect between him and Anderson in the long distance events.

The preliminaries for the meet will be held Friday, but the finals will occur Saturday afternoon. Nebraska's team will leave Thursday noon. About fifteen or sixteen men will be taken, the number being limited by the expense of the long trip to Des Moines.

In the workout this afternoon, Gay Reed will run a handicap race with Nebraska's sprinters. Reed is running regular and is making a strong attempt to come back into his old shape before the Olympic tryouts, which are to be held June 8th at Chicago. The team to go from Nebraska to attend these tryouts now includes Reed, McGowan and Racely. Racely made the decision to enter the preliminaries but recently, but has been kept in good condition by his work as a representative of Nebraska. All three of these men are considered very fast in their particular line and their chances of making places on the team seem good.
