TRACK TEAM LEAVES FOR MEET

COACH STIEHM AND HIS MEN READY FOR VALLEY CONTEST.

CORNHUSKERS ARE IN CONDITION

Racely, Anderson, McGowan, May, Barney, Bates, Christmas and Wherry to Be Point Winners.

The majority of the track team left with Coach Stiehm yesterday afternoon for Des Moines to participate in the Missouri Valley meet; Guy Reed with the remainder of the team leaves this afternoon.

The team will be strengthened by the presence of Racely in the sprints. The coaches for a time feared that the injury received at Kansas would rob Nebraska of the services of her premier dash man in the Valley meet Saturday. His leg is still sore, but should be considerably better than it is now. Racely is running chances by competing in the Valley meet of so injuring his lame leg that he will be kept out of the Olympic tryouts. However, as that is more or less individual competition, he prefers to give what he has in the Missouri Valley, where what points he may win will count for Nebraska.

Anderson, Nebraska's sure point winner and captain, has been suffering from a sore muscle. However, his chances for winning the mile event are not threatened to any great extent. "Andy" will compete in the mile and will run on the relay team.

McGowan who at present holds the Valley record in the half mile, is in better shape than he has been all season. Bermond, the Missouri star, is the man that "Beany" will have to

On Friday evening, in the Temple Theatre, the eighteenth annual concert of the school will occur, but given by the seniors rather than by the juniors, as was formerly the custom. The regular graduating exercises will be held Saturday.

Thirteen members of the school, all girls, will receive diplomas this year. Of these, nine have specialized in piano, three in voice and one in violin.

SPEAKERS FAVOR SINGLE TAX

SPECIAL CONVOCATION AROUSES ENTHUSIASM FOR PLAN.

STIMULATES STUDENT ACTIVITY

Nebraska Students Urged to Get Together on This Community Measure for Their Own Sakes.

At a special convocation, held yesterday for the purpose, the movement for a single tax was begun with a telling impetus. Guy Reed, who has been pushing the proposition for some time, had an attractive program arranged which kept the majority of the large audience that filled the chapel until after twelve o'clock.

After a few selections by the Glee Club, Dean Bessey was introduced and in characteristic manner presented to the students a few terse ideas worth remembering. He emphasized the point that the more one puts into his college life the more good he derives from it; that in the end one cannot receive without giving.

Anan Raymond, a member of the junior law class, and a graduate of the class of 1911, was the next speaker. He dealt with the subject from the student's point of view and in the course of his remarks answered the arguments levied by the opposition. The present plan contemplates the exemption of such students from payment of the tax upon their application for such relief from the Chancellor.

Strikes Popular Chord.

Mr. Raymond struck a popular chord when he said in part: "There is too much enlightened selfishness around this University. What we need to do is to forget our own little
