EXTEMPORANEOUS DEBATE.

Nothing in recent years has attracted such general and such sincere interest as has the question of the Single Tax. A large and earnest group of students gathered yesterday afternoon at one-thirty, and by sufficient additions from time to time, maintained their strength in numbers and enthusiasm during most of the afternoon.

Logical arguments were introduced on both sides of the question and their refutation caused many students to think, who have formerly, perhaps, never seriously considered the welfare and the problems of their University.

Laying aside the aspects of the problem, the question of their right and wrong, the very fact that a number of students were sufficiently interested to spend hours in discussion is highly encouraging. It prophesies that "spontaneity" which, as has so often been said, is essential to a true University spirit. Extemporaneous debates are exceedingly scarce at this University, in fact, at any university, and their benefits cannot be underestimated. The power to think clearly on a moment's notice is a faculty well worth cultivating.

THEFT UNCALLED FOR.

The only disagreeable feature of yesterday's open debate was the stealing of one of the petitions. This act in itself is far from commendable; considered purely from the standpoint of right and wrong, it is to be condemned. Such an act might be expected in the tumultuous debates and ensuing physical struggle which so often characterizes a high school discussion, but its appearance in University circles is absurd.

GEOLOGISTS TAKE TRIP.

Go to Milford This Morning to Study Old Glacial Formations.

Classes in Geology 21 and Geography 19 will leave this morning for Milford for the purpose of making geological observations both on the way to and at Milford. The girls will be in the charge of Miss Griffith and the boys of Professor Bengtson.

The trip will be the final one of the year and will have for its object the examination of the exposure of the two great glacial sheets of Nebraska as shown by the railroad cuts on the way to the town and of the characteristics of the Blue river and the rock outcrops near Milford.
