Being a Brief Resume of the Events of the Past Week, as Gleaned from Nebraska Files.

The second stride in the M. V. championship series marked an advance for Nebraska in the Kansas Aggie game Saturday. The forward pass did not bring good results for the team, but by straight football the score was clinched, 39 to 6.

The Nebraska stock judging team returned from the English Royal Stock Show at Kansas City with highest honors. A total of four cups was secured, one for first place and three for individual honors.

Registration starts at the School of Agriculture with prospects for an increased attendance. Later and final reports make it 395, an increase of 40 over last year.

Coach Stiehm announces plans for alumni "home-coming" week, to be finished in a blaze of reawakened loyalty by the Kansas game.

After a week of anxiety on the part of the Greeks and investigation by the students' organization committee the bars are lifted and 94 men pledge fraternity.

At the first meeting of the two lower classes the minor officers are elected and standing committees are appointed.

Seventeen men were selected for the Mandolin Club out of a large number of contestants.

With Mastin, Purdy, Pearson and Harmon on the hospital list, the Cornhuskers present a badly damaged front. Jim Harvey and Tate Matters, old "N" men, are visiting the coaches to meet the problem, however, and the slogan, "We fight to win," is adopted.

The Board of Regents met Wednesday evening and transacted routine business. Numerous ad interim appointments were confirmed.

Four candidates for the Rhodes scholarship competed in the examination held Tuesday and Wednesday.

COLLEGE ACTIVITIES.

The student who enters a university finds himself in an environment quite different from anything he has ever experienced, and he scarcely knows just what to do. There is an exterior surface of artificiality and frivolity which he sees in his daily life, and he often fails to get beneath the surface to the undercurrent of earnestness and purpose. The question is whether he will conquer his environment or whether it will conquer him.

After he has broken through this maze of unreality he sees the real world opened before him—the things really worth while. The various activities of the institution which he attends enable him to repay her in part for his education and also to make himself a broader and more intellectual man. There are activities enough for all, and activity in which one is particularly interested can be found at Nebraska—athletics, forensics, dramatics, music, and numerous others which aid in building the well-rounded man are found here. Every student in the University of Nebraska should take up some phase of training aside from the college curriculum.

The university is, after all, but the crucible in which the pure metal is separated from the dross, and the fine, rich gold which is a result of this separating process is the metal which has to bear the acid test of public criticism.
