HUSKERS WORKING

SECRET PRACTICE IN OLD FORMATION IS GONE THROUGH.

MEET RESERVES AGAIN TODAY

Adrian Feared to Be Bunch of Grim Scrapers—Three All-Michigan and Olympic Athlete Men in Lineup.

The first secret practice of the week was held yesterday afternoon on Nebraska field. No one was allowed on the field, even excluding the freshmen, who were forced to go to the State Farm for their evening romp. Coach Stichm evidently is going to take no chances of any spies getting any signals or trick plays which are intended for use against the Tigers. The varsity contented itself with running signals and a good drill in new plays.

Harmon was still absent from practice with his bad ankle. Potter was also missing from the ranks, being laid up with a "charley horse" and a fracture of one of the bones in the ankle. Mastin's shoulder is still quite sore; also Pearson's ankle.

The coach made quite a shift in the line the other night but it was only tentative, for last night all of the men were back in their old places. The forwards learned lots of football in the Minnesota game, and are more aggressive and speedy, although not as fast as they should be at this time of the season.

The Adrian College team is in the best of condition and hope to give the Huskers the game of their lives, and from the looks of the lineup they might be able to do it. They have lost but one game in the last two years, and that was to Notre Dame. In this game they used a substitute backfield, the other being used up in a game the week before. They at present hold the championship of the secondary colleges of the Middle West.

The lineup contains three all-Michigan men: Webster, playing left guard, is very fast and aggressive in the line and seldom fails to make a hole for the backfield to follow through; Marshall, left halfback and Marshall, quarterback, are the stellar performers in the backfield. Byrd, who plays fullback, was a member of the Olympic team and captured second place in the discus throw. They leave for Lincoln this afternoon and expect to arrive here tomorrow morning at 10:30.

The weekly varsity-freshman game will be played this afternoon at the athletic field. The scrimmage will not take place until nearly 5 o'clock, but you can come out and amuse yourself by watching the team run signals and pick up a few rudiments of the game.
