

REGISTER SATURDAY TIGERS SEEK BLOOD

LAST OPPORTUNITY GIVEN TO GET VOTING RIGHT.

POLLS OPEN 8 A. M. TO 9 P. M.

Those Registering Last April and Who Have Not Moved Need Not Re-register for the Coming Fall Election.

The last registration of voters will be held Saturday, October 26, 1912, from 8 a. m. to 9 p. m., and the following information will answer many questions that will arise in the minds of students:

First—Voters will please remember that a new registration of all persons entitled to vote is required by law each year.

Second—Persons that registered at the time of voting on April 19, and are now living in the same precinct they did at that time, do not need to re-register.

Third—Voters that registered on April 19, primary election day, and have moved from their former residence, should appear before the registration board in their old precinct and secure a certificate of removal, and take such certificate of removal to the board in the precinct where they now reside and have their registration entered up anew.

Fourth—First voters that have not registered before or that will become of age on or before November 5 are entitled to register Saturday, October 26, if they have the general qualifications, which are set out in the statute as follows: "Every male person who shall have resided in the state six months, in the county forty days, and in the precinct ten days," and "persons of foreign birth who shall have declared their intention to become citizens conformably to the laws of the United States on the subject of naturalization, at least thirty days prior to an election, shall be electors."

HOPE TO WIPE OUT DEFEAT BY SOONERS LAST YEAR.

THATCHER WILL PLAY AT FULL

Famous Lineman and Discus Thrower Will Materially Strengthen Backfield—Shepherd to Play Half—Quarters in Better Shape.

COLUMBIA, Mo., Oct. 24. (Special to the Daily Nebraskan, by V. W. Talley.) The Tigers left for Norman, Okla., yesterday without a single rooter accompanying. Twenty players made the trip. The game is to be on Friday.

Tiger rooters are not very confident of winning the game. The Sooners seem to have a much better team than they had last year, as they scored three touchdowns on Texas last Saturday. Last year they defeated Texas only 6 to 3. Reports from Norman say that Coach Benny Owen has such good material that he had to put his last year's men on the second team.

Barton, Missouri's best lineman, was left in the hospital suffering from tonsillitis. This lessens Missouri's chances of winning considerably, as Barton is without a doubt the star of the Tigers, if they can be said to have a star. He was easily the best defensive player on the field in the Ames game. He will be in the Nebraska game, however, unless he gets very sick, which is not probable. His absence in the Nebraska game would put all hopes of a Missouri victory to a flight, what few there are.

Not a rooter is predicting a victory over Nebraska. They are all hoping that the Tigers will hold the Cornhuskers to a smaller score than Ames made, but that is all. There have been no odds large enough so far to tempt any loyal Tiger adherent to risk his money.

The Ames game was full of surprises for Tiger coaches and followers in regard to the playing of the team. Before the game the line was a much abused part of the team on account of its alleged weakness, while the backfield was considered Missouri's strength.

The line, although outweighed almost ten pounds to the man by the Iowa Cyclones, was almost impregnable, and Ames was forced to use a great deal of open play. Missouri's backfield, on the other hand, failed to show, and as a result the coaches are at present confining their attention to it.

Prof. C. L. Brewer will experiment with an almost new backfield in the Oklahoma game Friday. Thatcher, the giant lineman and discus hurler, will be tried at full. "Thatch" is the strongest man physically on the team and is a powerful and accurate forward pass thrower. Shepard, former full-back, has been shifted to half, where he seems to fit better.

Missouri will not experience the difficulty of being without quarterbacks when they meet the Cornhuskers as
