

# TIGER LUCK TURNS LINCOLN VS. OMAHA

TONSILLITIS HITS MISSOURI WITH DISASTROUS EFFECTS.

## STAR PLAYERS ARE AFFECTED

Clay, Wiggins and Barton Not in Form —Tigers Looking for Unexpected Nevertheless—Satisfied with Their Heavy Line.

COLUMBIA, Mo., Oct. 30. (Special to the Daily Nebraskan, by V. W. Talley.)—Tonsillitis has invaded the Tiger camp with disastrous results. Two of the men are unable to report and two are in a very weakened condition on account of it. The two men out are Clay and Wiggins. The latter is the star 140-pound half who has been showing great form this year in running with the ball. He probably will not be able to play Saturday. Clay, the other man, will be able to appear in suit, but not to put his best efforts into the game.

Barton, Missouri star tackle, was the worst affected. He lost more than ten pounds during his sickness and is in a very weak condition. He is playing now, but is not the same Barton who starred in the Ames game. Every precaution is being taken to keep the disease from spreading.

A general spirit of confidence in the Tigers prevails after the excellent work that they showed against the Sooners. McWilliams is in great form and will doubtless run the team Saturday. No one is rash enough to predict a Missouri victory, but everyone has a sneaking idea that the Tigers will pull the unexpected like they did at Norman.

Missouri expects to fully hold her own in the line, but in the backfield it is another matter. The coaches are experimenting with the backfield and no one knows just who will start in the Nebraska game.

## VICTORY ASSURED TO NEITHER

Tradition Gives Lincoln Victory on Home Grounds, But Purple's Team Comes Prepared to Fight to Finish.

NEXT Saturday afternoon one of the prettiest exhibitions of football that has been given this year will be pulled off on Nebraska field when Omaha and Lincoln clash. The two schools are rivals in every sense of the word, and a great game may be expected. The two elevens are about evenly matched in both weight and speed, and each suffered one defeat, and that by the Des Moines teams.

The Lincoln team has a backfield that is hard to beat, for they are fast and sure. The line is quite heavy and has been able to withstand the attacks of the opponents' backfield with good success so far this season. Captain Doyle, who has been bothered with a bad ankle sustained in the Hastings game, is in good shape, and great things are expected of him in the Omaha game.

The Omaha eleven is in good trim and prepared for nothing but victory. The forwards are aggressive and very fast. The backfield, although a little light, is very shifty. The Omaha backs are very good with the forward pass and have used it for good gains in the games played this year.

Since 1899 the two teams have met fourteen times. Lincoln has won seven and tied two out of the fourteen. The Omaha delegation, two hundred strong, with the Omaha High School Band, are coming down Saturday morning over the Rock Island, expecting to win.

The officials for the contest have been chosen, and the following will officiate: James Harvey, captain of Nebraska in '09, will act as referee, Kearnes, ex-Bellevue, and Lofgren, ex-Nebraska, will alternate as umpire and head linesman.
