SECRETARY REITZEL ISSUES A FOLDER SHOWING WORK DONE.

WAKENS INTEREST IN CHURCHES

University Y. M. C. A. Doing Much to Get Students Interested in Local Churches—Students Become Department Heads.

Secretary Reitzel of the University Y. M. C. A. has issued a folder presenting the accomplishments of the association during the past month. These circulars show that the association is doing much to help students in getting started in the University.

Perhaps the most significant work accomplished is that in connection with the churches. Many people, judging from the newspaper headlines, easily get the impression that the main feature of student life is athletics, and a little study mixed in occasionally. The Y. M. C. A. has done much to correct this impression by showing that a large number of students are engaged in the various activities connected with the church. Of the many worthy lines of activity entered into, the following are among the most significant:

1. An investigation shows that over 100 University men are holding responsible offices in the churches of Lincoln, either as presidents of young people's societies, as teachers, or as members of various committees.

2. As a result of a personal canvass carried on by the association 500 men have been enrolled in the church Bible Study classes. These classes are held in the churches at the regular Bible School hours. Most of the courses are designed to meet the problems of student life.

3. Mission Study classes are also being organized in the churches near the University. The classes are formed in conjunction with the church young people's societies.

The association emphasizes not only church attendance but active church work.
