KANSAS MENTOR FINDS DEFICIENCY IN LINE SERIOUS.

FIGHTING SPIRIT AT LOW EBB

Nevertheless, K. U. Backers Refuse to Accept Rival Dopesters' Views—Hard Scrimmage the Order After Washburn Game.

LAWRENCE, Kas., Nov. 12.—(Special to the Daily Nebraskan, by E. B. Hackney.)—With but four days to prepare for Nebraska and not two weeks' time before the Missouri game, the situation which faces the Jayhawker coaches is one that would cause many a coach to give up all hope.

Truly the situation is one which can only be solved by hard work. But three men seem to have their positions cinched in the line. They are Helvern at center, Weidline at guard, and Captain Brownlee at end. All the rest of the positions must be assigned to some man on short notice and to whom they will go seems to be as much a question as ever.

Fighting Spirit Weak.

Then in addition to the deficiency in the kicking that must be remedied is the lack of $\frac{1}{2}$ ght that has been exhibited by the Mosse-Frank warriors at times. True the defense put up under the shadow of the Kansas goal posts has been of the A No. 1 variety. But just the opposite has usually been the case in midfield defensive work. The Jayhawkers will fight for one down and loaf on the next. Their tackling also has been weak and not up to the standard of former years. Very rarely is a man thrown with sufficient force to hurt him.

However, if the Kansans show the kind of fight which was exhibited by Kansas in former years the outcome of the next two games will not be nearly so certain as certain Cornhusker and Tiger sport writers dope it to be. On the other hand, if Kansas displays no more interest in the contest than was shown at Topeka, the Jayhawk will undoubtedly lose the remaining favorite tail feathers.

Everybody Works at Jayhawk Camp.

Work is the watchword of the Kansas coaches and the first night after the return from Topeka was spent in a hard scrimmage. Very few of the freshman regulars were in suits. Neither Dalton, Bishop, Bottomly, James nor Burton, regulars on the freshman eleven, were out, and the Kansas backs plowed through the freshman for large gains. Parker, Miller and Coolidge started the scrimmage in the backfield.

In the line Bramwell and Tudor played guard and Coleman took Burnham's place at tackle. Milton and Price were used at end.

Most of the time was spent in teaching the men offensive plays and no attention was given to the defense. The coaches will probably spend most of the week on this point.

AVAILABLE MATERIAL FOR OLYMPICS NOW LINED UP.

KEEPING INFORMATION SECRET

Refuse to Divulge the Identity of Tteam—Final Rally Will Be Held Thursday in Temple Building at 11:30.

Action on the Olympics in the sophomore class has been slowly gathering force and prospects for a spirited scrap by the second-year men are assuming serious proportions. At first even the most conservative were doubting the ability of the sophs to overcome the weight of the freshmen numbers, but present plans show that a determined stand is being taken.

The first call for candidates for try-outs met with a listless response, contrasted with the enthusiastic turnout of the freshman. Bryan, chairman of the sophomore committee, took this reverse as an excuse for some rapid work and began rounding up the available material. In the events, all but the grand slam, the individual work of members of the class will do much toward raising the score, since these men are experienced in the meet of last year. But it is the rush, made dangerous by the hordes of freshmen who usually turn out to this event, that the second-year men are bending their energies toward taking.

The general attitude of the sophs is that of one holding on to a weighty secret, for thus far their work has been largely in the dark. The members of the team have been picked, but the chairman of the committee refuses to divulge their identity, preferring to acquaint the freshmen with them in plenty of time, but not until then. Whether it is through fear of divulging information detrimental to their interests or it is some diplomatic coup is not known, the fact remains that, but their information has been jealously guarded.

A final rally will be held Thursday in the Temple at 11:30 and all sophomores willing to help destroy the precedent of the last two years, when the freshmen have captured the Olympics with comparative ease and set a record for their own class, that of winning for two years in succession, will be expected to help crowd the theater to the doors. —Hank.
