A delegation of about two hundred members of the Omaha Stock Ex change will inspect the State Farm next Saturday. This is the annual trip of the Omahans to the Farm. The dormitory girls will serve dinner to the visitors, and in the afternoon the stockmen will attend the Kansas Nebraska game in a body. Next spring the Farm students will be favored by a visit to the Omaha stockyards as a return of hospitality.

Work on the Plant Industry Building at the Farm is progressing slowly. The building will probably be completed next summer in time for next year's term of school. The contract for this \$80,000 structure was given to George Shoul of Seneca, Kas. The material is of the Bedford limestone and known as the "Pedestrian Club." The gray pressed brick, the same as that of Agricultural Hall. Thus it is in harmony with the architectural plan of he campus. There will be three floors, occupied respectively by the horticulture department, entymology department, and the department of agricultural botany. 
