The writer does not claim that according to the conference rules Ross is entitled to his "N," because he will admit that he is not acquainted with the said rules, but having attended every home game and having personally seen Ross in those said games, and knowing that said Ross played practically the entire game at Minnesota and was not allowed to play at Missouri through no fault of his own, it seems to the writer at least, and no doubt to others, that he deserves an "N" for his year's work.

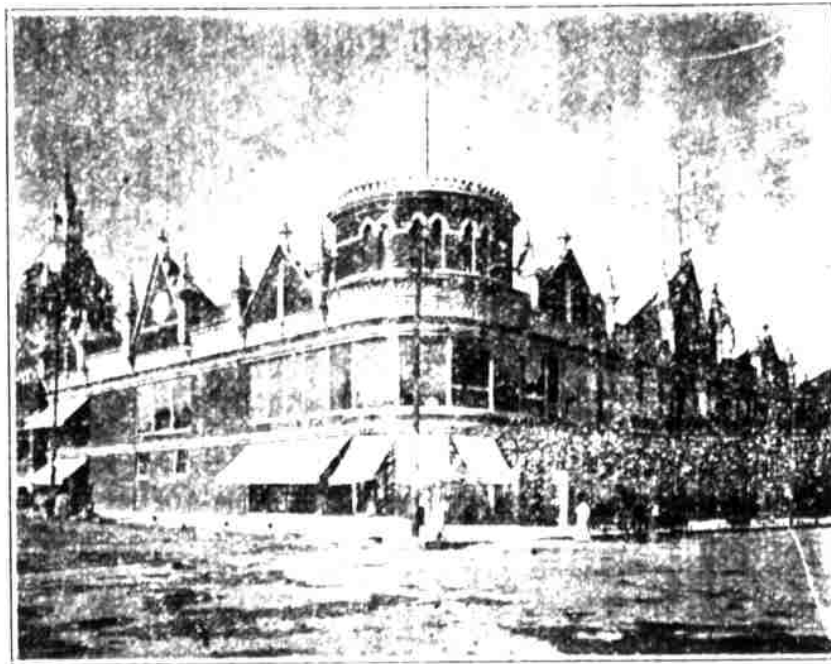
