

**BUILDING NEAR COMPLETION**

Department of Plant Industry Gets New Quarters Soon—Work Tests Far Above Contract Grade.

**AMPLE ROOM FOR ALL BRANCHES**

The Plant Industry building at the State Farm is being completed. The final coat of plaster is being put on, and they are cleaning and grading around the building. Indications are that the building will be occupied during the first part of next semester.

The building was designed in Supt. C. E. Chowin's office by E. E. Anderson, 1905. John Rippey, Neb., 1912, is inspector of the building. It is a white structure 66 by 140 feet. The material used in the construction is Bedford limestone, and it is said to be one of the best pieces of brick work in the state.

A Kahn floor test has been made in one of the lecture rooms, the floor being subjected to a load of 200 pounds to the square foot, with a maximum deflection of one-half inch. While the contract allows for a deflection of one inch.

The Horticultural Department will occupy the first floor and part of the basement, the Military Department using the remainder of the basement. The Agronomy Department will use the second floor in conjunction with the Entomology Department. The third floor will be devoted to Agricultural botany.

Regent Copeland, who was most influential in furthering the building, has inspected it, and expressed himself as being very well pleased with the work.—J. R. W.
