# THREE MEN PASS RHODES EXAM.

Two Men From State Eligible for Appointment-Harvard Man Also Makes Application

### APPOINTMENT MADE THIS MONTH

W. F. Crossland of Wayne, Paul F. Good of Lincoln, and Ross L. New kirk of Exeter, are the three men who will represent the state of Ne braska in the contest for election to a Rhodes scholarship. This announcement was made by the Chancellor yesterday, he having received the report from the examining board at Oxford

Crossland is a senior at Wesleyan University and is the only one that succeeded in passing the examinations given several weeks ago. Good took his examination at Harvard, but registered from Nebraska, which is his home. Newkirk passed the examination two years ago from Wesleyan, but failed to receive the appointment at the hands of the committee at that time, Horace English being his successful competitor. He is, however, eligible this year and will be the University of Nebraska candidate before the judging committee, having transferred his allegiance from the Methodist school to the University this year.

After the respective candidates pass their examinations they have to submit their names to a committee, which committee determines upon the physical and moral qualifications of the candidates. This decision is made upon the merits of the case as presented by the evidence placed before the committee. This board is composed of teh following Nebraska educators: Chancellor Avery, chairman; Chancellor Fullmer of Wesleyan, Chancellor Oeschger of Cotner, Chancellor Schell of York College, and Supt. E. # MUSEUM ACQUIRES BIG MOLARS

Two Large Teeth of Prehistoric Ele phant Added to Collection-Some Specimens May Be Returned.

The University Museum yesterday received two molar teeth of a gigantic prehistoric elephant, scientifically known as Elephas Columbi. These were collected a number of years ago by Drs. Frederick J. and Franklin Schaufelberger, of Hastings, Neb., and are loaned by them to the Museum.

One tooth is of extraordinary size and it is doubtful if there is a larger or better one in any western museum. The size of this one tooth is as follows: Greatest length, 16 Inches; depth, 12 inches, and breadth 5 inches. The grinding surface of this tooth is 5 by 8 inches. The weight of the tooth when taken fro inthe ground was 22

A mate to this great upper molar was found at the same time, but it could not be secured at the time and is now in a remote part of the state. It possible, it will be added to the Museum at a later date.

The new specimens will be placed on exhibition Thursday.

There are a number of fine specimens which should be in the Museum, out which are now in the possession of the U.S. Geological Survey, that may be returned to Nebraska soon, according to Professor Barbour. It is the opinion of the government offlmens taken from the different states some time ago should be returned to them. If this goes into effect, Ne. braska will receive a number of specimens which will make a valuable ad-
