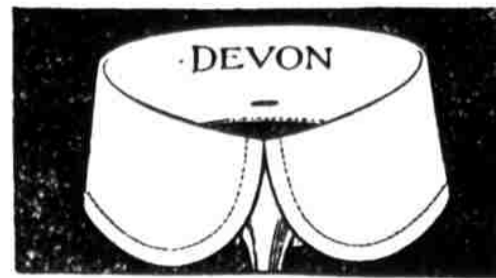
his address at "nearly a thousand people" when there were fully twice that number present and hundreds turned away for want of seating facilities.
