OUR CENSURED POLICY.

According to a "news" story appearing in last night's edition of the Lincon Daily Star, the Daily Nebraskan, ed among other things, is charged with having taken its stand in favor of University removal pursuant to orders from the office of the chancellor of the University. The policy of the paper has been left free and unrestrained to take what course it would, and as long as we handle this question from a purely student point of view, we do not anticipate any interference from the authorities.

We need hold no brief for Chancellor Avery. His position among the people of this community outside of the editorial rooms of the Star office, is carte blanc secure. But it is with

no little chagrin that students of the University see him maligned by an unscrupulous newspaper, especially when it is known that the very men who comprise the editorial force of that paper and who furnish the brains for the subterfuge which it prints, are students and former students of the Associate Editor. Kenneth M. Snyder University, men who have held, and do now hold, a place high in the councils of the student body and yet who, in order to earn their livelihood are forced to turn traitors to the institution, which in private life, they are credited as supporting. For our attiture toward the removal issue, we assume sole responsibility, and are willing to receive any criticism that is J. R. Wood, I. K. Frost, Leon Samuel due. The Nebraskan, on this proposition, pleads good faith with the student, and for the sake of what influence we may have over them, we resent and oppose as false, the charge that our stand is not our own.

VALLEY LEADS EAST

The 1913 rules were announced in Basketball Rules Association. which met in New York last spring. Most of the features embodied in the new rules, however, had already been adopted by the Missouri Valley Basketball Conference, which met in Kansas City several months prior to this, and were used in last year's games.

The principal changes for this season are as follows:

1. "All players must be numbered." This was done by Missouri Valley players last year.

2. 'Interference in any way with the progress of a player is not allowed." This will tend to eliminate all unnecessary roughness.

3. "No attempts shall be made to disconcert a free-thrower,"

4. "Only ten second shall be taken from the time the ball is laid down for the free throw." Formerly all the time could be taken that was want-

5. "Any player making four personal fouls shall be disqualified." This also applies chiefly to eastern schools, where a single player often made fif-
