University Rifle Squad to Be Recruited From All Students, Whether Cadets or Not.

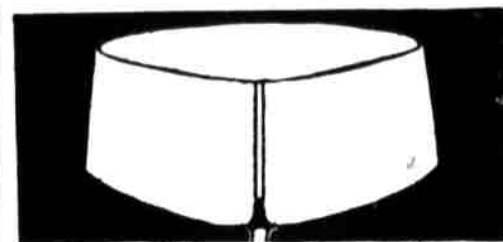
Tryouts for the next competitive match will be held Thursday afternoon, January 23, from 2 till 5 o'clock. All members of the rifle squad should report sometime during that period.
