In order to acord an opportunity to those interested in rifle firing, a cordial invitation is extended to all to use the rifles and gallery equipment. Also an invitation is extended for all to join the University of Nebraska Rifle Club.

Student members of this club are eligible to compete for the rifle team which represents the university in the intercollegiate rifle competition in which most of the large universities participate. No initiation fee is required.

The universities of the country are divided into two leagues, as follows: Eastern League:
