RUTHLESS MANDATE WORRIES CROOKED CO-EDS

Pledge Day is Indefinitely Postponed by Head of Inter-sorority Conucil on Accusation of Illegal Rushing.

After five months of continuous and vigorous "rushing," with dozens of tired sorority girls, resting on their oars, so to speak, the irridescent bubble of hopes and well laid plans burst with the announcement that pledge day was indefinitely postponed. Miss Conklin, who on her own authority issued this mandate, was the subject of severe criticism when the girls learned of her action. But all that was minor compared with what they had to undergo through the inter-sorority council when they were told without a mincing of words that they were living in deceit and were founded on a fabric of lies.

Bids will be sent to Miss Conklin Thursday noon, but she will not send them out until some indefinitely later date.

Simultaneously with the announcement last week, the pipe of peace was hidden and warfare renewed among the Greeks. There was a variety of work to be done and certain "rushees" who were not yet spiked, must be spoken to privately and decorated with a "Hands Off" sign. Several amusing incidents are told of, especially in one case where a prominent sorority girl was known to call up a rival and request her "as a matter of honor" to let a certain freshman alone who had already been dishonorably "spiked."

It is stated that there are at least five fraternity jewelers in town who are waiting to take orders from the pledges to be. They are naturally inclined to be emphatic in their opinion or rather their denunciation of university laws.

The co-eds also are harsh in their criticism of the mandate, claiming that after the unusual financial burdens incurred by second semester pledging, it is unfair to prolong the unnecessary expenditure, and that the present delay is both uncalled for and unwarranted.

GETS NEW EQUIPMENT

Department of Agricultural Engineering Receives Several Valuable Pieces of Machinery.

The Department of Agricultural Engineering has recently received from the J. I. Case Threshing Machine company, a full sized sectional 30 H. P. steam engine.

This piece of machinery shows all the working parts of the engine in cross-sectional view, with the valves marked in such a way that students may learn how valves should be set from it. It is a completely finished model and weighs about 3,000 pounds.

Other apparatus received by the department are a Huber engine taken off the trucks and fitted with equipment for making tests; a Reeves Compound 40 H. P. gasoline tractor and a Case 40 H. P. gasoline tractor for field work

As soon as the season opens it will also have an Aultman-Taylor gasoline tractor and steamer, a Rumley Oil Pull and International gasoline or kerosene tractor, an Avery tractor, and a Case steamer.

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
