Miss Kathryn Yates was a unique character, an overwhelming personality. She had no enemies, no, on the contrary there were but few students who could not claim the pleasure of her acquaintance and to know her was to love her. Democratic even to the extreme that her friends criticised her for it, she made it a point to meet everybody with a smile. Such a greeting was a veritable inspiration, an impulse to put one's best energies to the task confronting him. To know her was to have a true friend.

Although she was always boosting, working, pulling to help someone or something, she never made herself prominent in any way. When honors fell to her share as they so often did, no ostentation or aristocratic aloofness followed in their train. Miss Yates whether in the moment of defeat or of victory was the personification of modesty.

Beginning her varied university career as vice-president of her freshman class, Miss Yates has never spent a moment without the responsibility for some affair resting upon her shoulders. She held the position of leading lady in dramatic club plays, responsible parts in class productions. Dramatic committees seldom omitted her name. In her junior year she was again honored with the vice-presidency of her class.

The year now passing stood to Miss Yates as the culmination of her edu-

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cation. Both her mother and she herself had often talked of the happy time coming, of the cherry social life she was leading this year of her responsibility in the coming production of the senior play, and of her graduation. Then, just as these great anticipations were finally coming true—

Nebraska incurs the loss of Miss Kathryn Yates as the breaking of a sacred bond of fellowship, as the subtraction of one who was always a booster, and she extends to the bereaved family and to the sorrowful friends that sympathy and comfort which only a broken heart can tender for one whom it has long cherished and respected.

"NATURE" PUBLISHES SPEECH

English Scientific Journal Publishes Dean Bessey's Retiring Address.

The retiring address of Head Dean Bessey as president of the American Scientific Society, has been published in full by "Nature," an English scientific journal.
