## ALPHA SIGMA PHI COMING? ALPHA CHI OMEGA FORMAL

**Nebraska Seems Doomed To Have Another Fraternity In Midst Before Long.**

A group of prominent "barbs" have petitioned for a chapter of Alpha Sigma Phi according to the rumor traveling the inner circles of University gossip. Men who are known to have pledged themselves to its success are extremely reticent in telling of their plans, yet it is generally acknowledged that the opening of school next fall will see another Greek letter fraternity applying for admission to the Pan-Hellenic council.

A banquet was held at the Lindell Hotel during the early part of last semester. A "News" reporter who had been tipped off, attempted to gain admission to the hall but was shut out. So many startling rumors have originated from that fact, that it is only fair to the would-be Greeks to lay them at rest. At one time no less than five calls came into the "Rag" office during a single day asking if it was true that either D. K. E. or Alpha Delta were coming to Nebraska.

Alpha Sigma Phi is a national fraternity with ten active chapters and some eight or nine hundred members. The most prominent chapters are located at Marietta, Michigan and Yale. The fraternity was founded as a Sophomore society at Yale in 1846, and suffered several reorganizations, existing for some time as a local frat. Alpha Sigma Phi is known to have tried for a number of years to establish a chapter at Nebraska.
