MUCH MUSIC FRIDAY

GLEE AND MANDOLIN CLUBS GIVE ANNUAL HOME CONCERT HARMONY LOVERS' PARADISE.

Program Promises Much in Store—Prices are Placed Lower than Usual.—Temple Theatre.

Friday evening in the Temple theater the two musical clubs of the University will unite their talent in a festival of fun and music. Trained by a week on the road and beaten into shape by competent instructors, they have prepared an entertainment worthy of the best professionals. The program has not been hastily put together on a few weeks notice, but is the result of months of conscientious practice on the most suitable selections. Never before has this organization been so familiar with their pieces or so well conducted.

The program in which the two clubs alternate consists of everything to satisfy the tastes of a University audience. It shifts heartlessly in places from the sublime to the ridiculous and never stays in one place long enough to grow monotonous. They play and sing the latest rags with the same delicacy of touch and harmony with which they render the works of music masters. They carry you from the footlights of the Orpheum stage to the salons of Vienna.

The home concert night of the clubs has always been an important social event of the University and indications are that a winning crowd will turnout on Friday night.

Tickets are 20 and 35 cents, and may be secured at the Y. M. C. A. desk in the Temple. Concert begins at 8:15 sharp.

The management has broken all precedents in establishing a minimum rate of admission to this event. Formerly the scale of prices ranged from \$1.50 to 50 cents, and was to have held for this year also, but under the influence of popular opinion the club was induced to put their prices within the range of everyone. The first skirmish in the war on extravagance has taken place, with an overwhelming victory for the common people.
