THROW OFF THE BALLAST.

The greatest problem confronting the students as an organized body is to get rid of their ostensible men. Too many activities are in the hands of men who failed to make twelve hours in their last semester's work. The Phi Beta Kappa element is too noticeably lacking in athletics, dramatics, the innocent society and the Rag staff. Conspicuously was this fact brought to our attention by an order from the delinquency committee to discharge from our staff five men who failed to make the required number of credits. Indications are strong that the same University officials are commanding other activities to throw off their ballast.

We cannot too often emphasize the fact that for all kinds of prominence and notoriety in the University a reasonable record in one's studies is a supreme asset. In the case of prominence, grades are an advertisement; in case of notoriety, they are a defense. It is in every way to an active student's advantage to stay out of activities until last semester's work for a degree is over.

The University, too, has a good right

to insist that above all else studies must come first. Any other rule would destroy its usefulness, and in a very short time, make it a back-number in the world of education. Student sentiment must be drummed until it appreciates the superior significance of study.

We must get behind the twelve-hour rule. We must encourage the kind of students that will be ashamed to work on a student publication if they can't make their credits. We must insist that those who are not ashamed to deceive the world as to their mission here retire from the activities and, if need be, from school. It is too obvious for demonstration that school pastimes must be kept in strict subordination to school work. And all those who really want an education, in addition to a chance to play with it, should join with the authorities in getting rid of the student in name only.

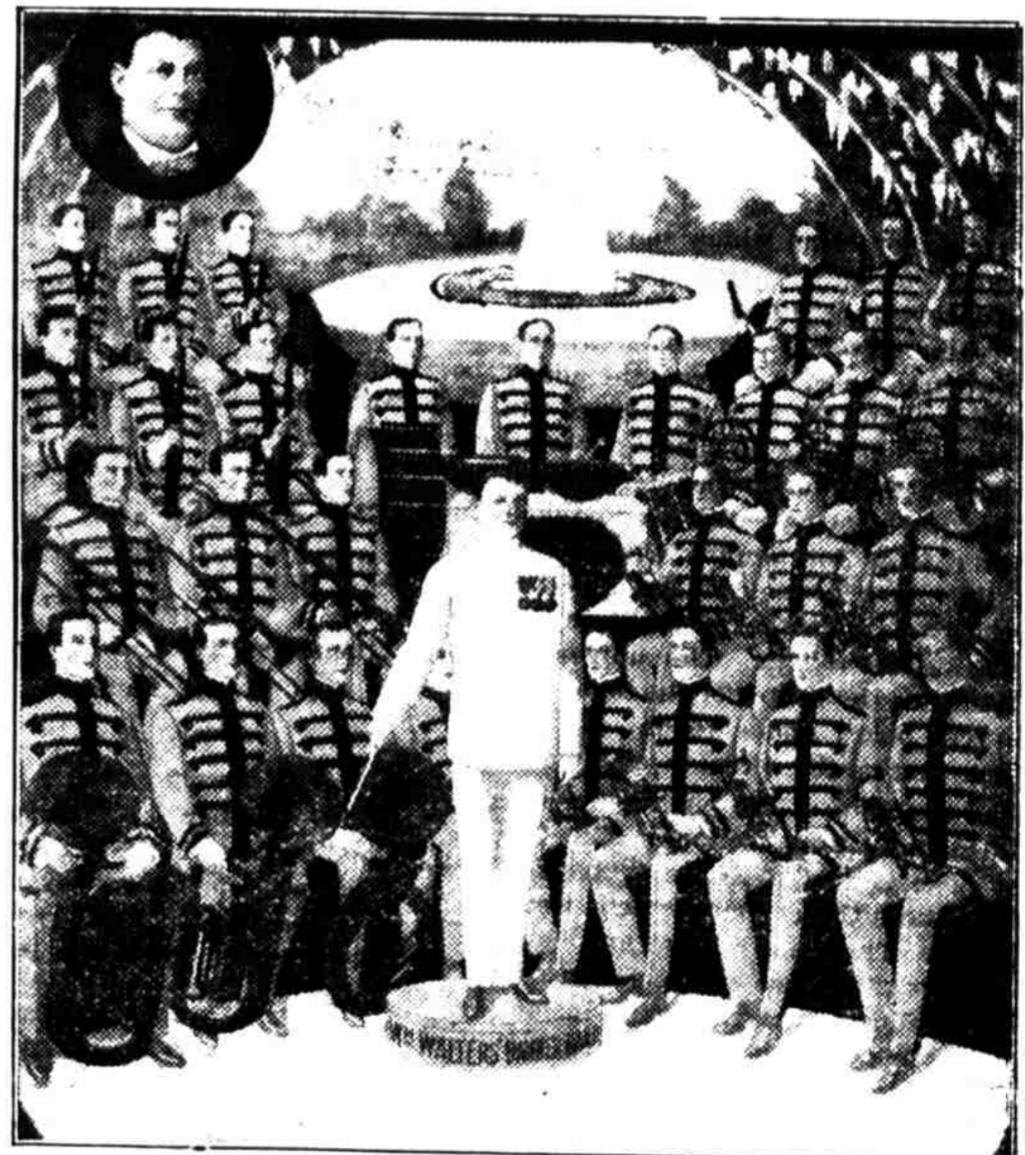
