good business acumen on the part of those to whom we pay it. David Starr Jordan, our commencement orator this year, fails to see the distinction, and in his latest book, *Unseen Empire*, discredits altogether the "in time of prepare for war" stuff.

"Certain general propositions may be laid down as to war and peace. To regard war as 'glorious' is to invite it. To regard it as a hideous calamity is to avoid it. The nation which holds war in the background as a possibility incase of difference is likely sooner or later to resort to it. The nation that eliminates war from its methods of adjustment will find peaceful methods at hand whenever differences do arise. To be pledged to arbitration is to be 'thrice armed,' for it is to have one's 'quarrel just.'"

The chief aim of military drill is not, so far as I can learn, to teach us to regard war as a 'hideous calamity.' It is rather to "hold war in the background as a possibility in case of difference," and to render the prospect of our locking horns with Germany or Japan, if not desirable, at least feasible. And because this does not appear to me a sane or effective way to eliminate war from our methods of adjustment, I am opposed to both military drill and its consequent premature Fourth-of-July parades.
