Glee Club Concert
Delayed by Absence
of Prof. Chatburn

The departure of Professor Chatburn, chairman of the committee of student organizations, for a ten day visit last week has caused the glee concert which was to have been given last Saturday evening was postponed until tonight. After preparations had been completed for tonight, it was found that no concert could be held on a school night. The chancellor states that no entertainment may be given without the consent of Professor Chatburn and Professor Chatburn being absent his consent is not obtainable in spite of the scheduling of the date. Meanwhile the musicians are awaiting the return of the absent professor, the Glee club posters are being decorated with red tape, and the concert remains indefinitely postponed.

MORE IMPROVEMENTS.

Speaking of many things the University can do in a small, and economical way to increase its usefulness and efficiency, one can suggest with little coercion that the Temple theatre should be generally overhauled. The walls of the theatre are obviously defective. The floors, corners and curtains are too dirty. And one is almost afraid to seat a well-dressed lady friend on one of the many broken seats for fear she'll slip to the floor. The curtains, required by statute to be fire-proof, are made of the most inflammable material. In fact the condition of the place in which the University produces its theatrical entertainments is decidedly "rummy."

The question which a business-like student body, a business-like faculty and a business-like board of regents will ask themselves is not whether the size and excellence of competing institutions demands that Nebraska be built up to their standard, but whether the equipment of Nebraska University is sufficient for Nebraska needs. To settle our policy of University expansion it is not necessary for us to discover what Illinois does, Iowa does or Minnesota does. The kind of a University that Nebraska taxpayers will pay for is the kind of a University that will suit Nebraska taxpayers. A frequent reassertion of this obvious fact seems necessary to prevent the occasional outburst of people who seem to think that we must have as good a University and exactly the same kind of a University that Wisconsin has. So long as we have not yet settled upon an extensive policy of University expansion and improvement, we should at least keep the small holes in the apparatus, we already have, patched up. Next to reflooring the armory and providing at very little expense for the dance that possesses us, we should make the Temple theatre a safe and presentable place for a University entertainment.
