pionship debate of the Nebraska High School Debating league. The debate will be held Saturday, May 17, in Memorial hall and it begins at 10 a. m. sharp.

The audience will be entertained and instructed by twelve speakers representing twelve district championship schools of the state. Each of the debaters will give an opening address of 7 minutes and a rebuttal speech of 4 minutes. Professor M. M. Fogg, president of the league, will be the presiding officer of the final forensic battle of the year, and the destinies of the warriors will be decided by the following judges: Dean W. G. Hastings of the College of Law; Prof. H. W. Caldwell of the Department of American History, and Prof. J. E. LeRossignol of the Department of Political Economy and Commerce.
