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## PLAY STARTS WITH VIM

PRELIMINARY PRACTICE BRINGS OUT 20 PLUNGING HUSKIES FOR 1913 SEASON.

## FIRST FORMAL PRACTICE TODAY

Whistle, Ushering in Season, Blows at 10 O'Clock This Morning—Old Men and New Out for Places.

The 1913 football season opens formally at 10 o'clock this morning, practice to begin immediately. So says "Jumbo" Steihm, director and guardian of the fortunes of the Scarlet and Cream for the coming year. In fact, the men have been playing at odd times for a week or more, the more faithful coming back with the coach several weeks ago.

Two dozen huskies were issued their togs yesterday afternoon, and for two hours exchanged kicks and tore up the turf with a vigor that listened good to the pessimistic Steihm. The back field causes him little worry, but the lack of old men in the line seriously cripples the effectiveness of the team and will make the coach hustle to develop suitable material from last year's freshmen.

With Howard at end, and plenty of good back field men for the skeleton of a team, Steihm has less than three weeks before the Washburn game in which to fill out his line.

Cameron, a sophomore, is spoken of most favorably as holding down the position at tackle. "Tuffy" Towle, quarterback, writes from New York that he will be back about the first of the month. "Too late for the Minnesota game," says the coach mournfully. Hawkins is the man scheduled for that job, according to pre-season dope. But it is as yet much too early to forecast rain or shine from the football weather map, while the next week or two may work wonderful changes in the Nebraska line-up, as well as her chance with Minnesota.

## GET YOUR SEASON TICKET

Advance Sale For Minnesota Game Out of Sight—Ticket Holders to Prift.

Manager Reed announces that the advance sale for the Minnesota game is the largest in the history of the school, the number of seats so far reserved or accounted for having already reached five thousand. Enough seats, however, have been saved in order to accommodate those who purchase season tickets.

Season tickets admitting to all the athletic events of the year go on sale at 1:00 o'clock this afternoon. They may be purchased only at the old Daily Nebraskan office in the basement of Administration Building. They may be reserved at Harry Porter's.

The Minnesota game will be the event of the annual homecoming for the alumni, and letters so far received indicate that the graduate will assemble at the game from all portions of the United States.

## KEEP INSTRUCTIONS IN MIND

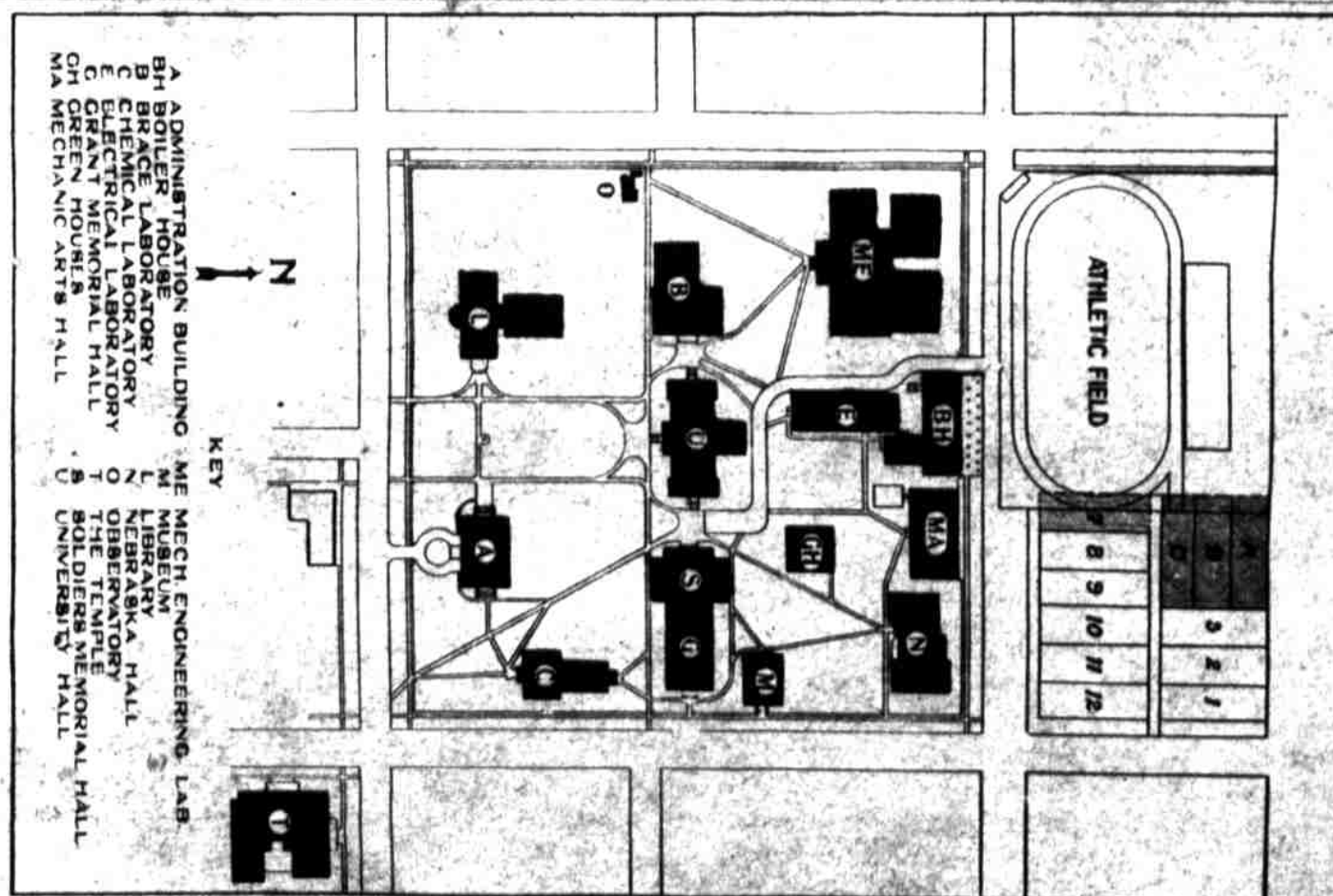
Confusion Incidental to Starting Year's Work May Easily Be Avoided If Instructions Noted.

First semester registration starts today, the tickets already given out at the Registrar's office permitting active registration in the Armory, including the filling out of schedules, to start at two o'clock. The Armory has been crowded with formidable rows of chairs awaiting the busy throng of old and new students and the Registrar's office has a corps of assistants prepared to accommodate the rush. Doc. Dales' skull cap has been neatly pressed for the occasion, while he himself is in fine trim to battle his way into the summer earnings that will pile up before him during the next few days.

With the hope of allaying the customary confusion that besets registration annually, the registrar has issued the following instructions, special attention in which is called to the fact that all new students will be required to do nothing whatsoever before seeing the Registrar in the east end of the Armory:

1. All new students will first see the Registrar in the Armory, east entrance.
2. All, except new students, first secure Assignment and Registration Ticket—west entrance Memorial Hall—for an hour in which to register. Allow sufficient time to prepare your application before your hour of registration.
3. All, except new students, see Advisers in their department offices. Prepare applications and secure approval of the Dean before the Com-
