ORGANIZATIONS TO "SWEAR OFF"

Dancers Must Promise to Substitute Waltz and Two-step For Tango and Boston.

Miss Graham, the new adviser to women, has lost no time in making public her stand on the question of extreme dancing at university functions. She states that she finds it necessary to positively prohibit all of the new dances, and she has devised a scheme for extracting a binding promise from each organization, to the effect that it will be responsible for all the dances that are practised on its floor during the event of which it is host. Her decision comes as a distinct disappointment to many amatuer artists whose summer experiences have led them to look upon the old forms of Terpsichorean practise with a superior disdain.

The adviser's scheme is in the form of a written promise which must be signed by the agent of each organization before the dance privilege will be granted, running as follows:

"Since all of the newer dances in use here at the present time are, as a rule, danced in an extreme manner, it is desired that only the waltz, two-step and fivestep be danced at any party given under the auspices of a University organization. We schedule the party with that understand-
